

A hundred years ago

In 1925, while the country focused on the massive undertaking of the Arapuni hydroelectric power scheme – the largest civil engineering project in New Zealand at the time – a much smaller but vital (and beautiful) structure quietly began to take shape: the Arapuni Suspension Bridge.

Though it didn't attract much media attention back then, the bridge played an essential role in connecting the Top Camp, the hub for workers and the future site of our village, with the western side of the gorge, where key construction activities were happening. The bridge is believed to have been shipped in prefabricated form from England, supplied by British firm Armstrong and Whitworth, who also held the main contract for the power station. Work on the bridge began in earnest in May 1925 with the laying of its concrete foundations. By December, the steel tower stood tall over the gorge, though the bridge itself was far from complete. Even by April 1926, the steel cables and decking were still being installed. The bridge was finally completed sometime between then and mid-1926 - but without fanfare or formal opening. Despite its understated arrival, the suspension bridge served a crucial function in linking the workforce to the heart of one of the country's most ambitious infrastructure projects.

Also in May 2025, the Roman Catholic community in Arapuni began plans for the construction of a new church. Materials were ordered, and local residents pitched in through working bees to help with the labour (pre-AVCA). The community also started a series of monthly dances, the first of which took place on May 15. Mesdames Donnelly and Keggarty were entrusted with overseeing the supper arrangements. Our Matariki Community Potluck Dinner continues in this tradition!
